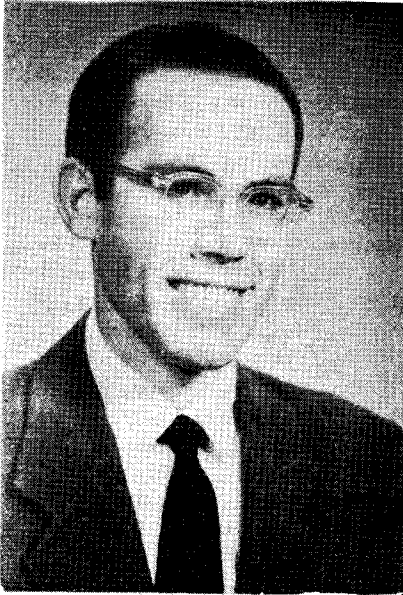

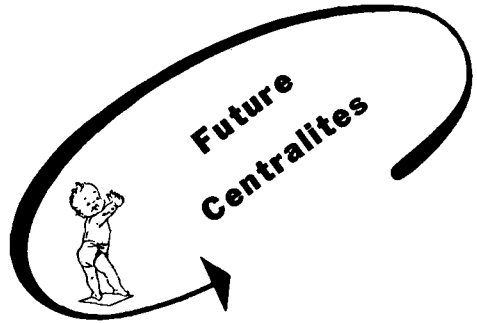

Directs Summer Institute

Dr. Dorothy Miller Matala, '35, was director of the Summer Institute for science and mathematics teachers, which was held at Iowa State Teachers College, Cedar Falls, Iowa, June 16 to August 8. This was one of the many summer institutes for college and high school teachers of science and mathematics which are sponsored by the National Science Foundation.

Ralph Hiatt Goes To University Of Michigan

The University of Michigan last May announced the appointment of Ralph Hiatt, '32, as research physicist in The University of Michigan Engineering Research Institute, effective July 1, 1958. He will be head of the experimental part of the Radiation Laboratory, which is doing research in the fields of basic electronics, radar and associated devices, anti-missiles systems, camouflage techniques and mathematics.

Before coming to Ann Arbor, Mr. Hiatt was at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology as research associate and chief of the Ipswich Antenna Station at the Radiation Laboratory from 1938 to 1942. He has been at the Air Force Cambridge Research Center as chief of the Ground Antenna Section from 1945 to 1955 and since then as chief of the Antenna Laboratory.

He received a Master of Arts degree from Indiana University in 1939. He taught mathematics and science at Portland, Indiana, from 1935 to 1938 and at Richmond, Indiana, from 1938 to 1942.

Schiering Thirty Years In Same Church

In a letter enclosing a check to the Alumni Association, Rev. H.C. Schiering writes "I am closing thirty years of service in the Parma Evangelical United Brethren Church, Parma, Ohio, where I came from Indiana Central back in 1927. These years have been most profitable and helpful."

Rev. Schiering was the first ordained pastor of a small congregation organized in October, 1927, which met in a little two-room schoolhouse. His ambition was to build a church and stay by the project until it was free from debt. A sanctuary was erected in 1930, added to in 1949, and again in 1956. The congregation has grown to 875 members, with a second pastor assigned to the work.

Rev. Schiering received an honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity from Otterbein College in 1946, recognizing his exceptional work in Parma, where he has been active in the Ohio East Conference, the Cleveland Church Federation, the Cuyahoga County Library Board, and a leader in the Parma Ministerium.
